The Northern Kentucky Addiction Helpline operates with the understanding that substance use disorder is a disease that affects individuals and families. It also impacts the community's health and public safety. According to the Mayo Clinic (2017), a substance use disorder is a disease that affects a person's brain and behavior, and leads to an inability to control the use of a legal or illegal drug, medication, and/or alcohol. Through this lens, the Helpline provides compassionate, trauma-informed, person-centered care to each caller, understanding that callers and their families have

very complex barriers to substance use treatment and recovery.

The Helpline, through community partnerships, can assist callers with inpatient and outpatient treatment options, often for the same day. The Helpline also works to navigate other barriers callers face, including homelessness, employability, mental and physical health concerns, broken family relationships, and incarceration. Above all, the Helpline believes there is **NO WRONG DOOR INTO TREATMENT**.

The Northern Kentucky Addiction Helpline also serves as a regional hub for diversion programs,

and provides outreach and support through Pre-Arrest Diversion and Quick Response Teams. Through this initiative, Helpline Care Coordinators partner with local first responders by visiting the homes of those who have overdosed and their families, providing substance use treatment and other resources. These visits give the Helpline the ability to connect community members who are in need of treatment to same day detoxification and inpatient services.

The Northern Kentucky Addiction Helpline is funded by Boone, Campbell and Kenton County Fiscal Courts, and St. Elizabeth

Healthcare. Oversight of the Northern Kentucky Addiction Helpline is provided by the Board of Directors, which is comprised of members from each of the funding entities, staff from the Northern Kentucky Health Department and the Northern Kentucky Drug Strike Force, and legislative liaison, Kentucky State Representative Kim Moser.

Hepatitis C – Are you at risk?

The Northern Kentucky Health Department recently declared an end to the hepatitis A outbreak affecting our region; however, there is another kind of hepatitis causing concern in our region – hepatitis C. Acute hepatitis C rates in Northern Kentucky (NKY) are among the highest in the nation. NKY makes up 10.3% of Kentucky's population, yet has 36.1% of the hepatitis C cases in the Commonwealth. In 2015, acute hepatitis C rates in NKY were:

- 3.5 times higher than the rate of the rest of Kentucky
- 11.9 times higher than the rate of the entire United States


Hepatitis C is a liver infection caused by the hepatitis C virus (HCV). Hepatitis C can range from a mild illness lasting a few weeks, to a serious, lifelong illness. Approximately 75%-

85% of people who become infected with HCV will develop a chronic infection. The virus is spread by contact with infected blood. Today, most people become infected with HCV by sharing needles or other equipment to prepare or inject drugs. However, people born from 1945-1965 are also at increased risk for hepatitis C.

Liver damage from hepatitis C can be prevented by early diagnosis and timely access to care and treatment. Unlike hepatitis A and B, there is no vaccine to prevent hepatitis C; however, hepatitis C can be treated and cured!

Testing and treatment for hepatitis C

NKY Health has a new program which provides free testing, as well

Avoiding pipe problems caused by invasive plant species

You probably know that trees and other plants require water and nutrients to grow, but did you know that when the ground lacks moisture, their roots will seek out any other available water source? This can result in roots infiltrating and causing damage to leaking or defective sewer pipes or joints.

Some trees, bushes and plants have a more invasive root system than others, so it's important to know what's growing near private or public sewer infrastructure. Soil condition can also affect how far roots will travel.

A number of factors can help determine if you might have a root issue. First and foremost: the age of the pipes. Sewer systems installed in the early 1900s were typically clay pipes in 3-foot sections mortared together at their joints. Over time, the mortar begins to crack and fall apart. In the 1960s, plumbers began using rubber gaskets when putting pipes together, but that didn't address all root issues. It wasn't until the arrival of PVC that root issues started



to diminish. But even PVC isn't fool-proof — root problems can surface if the pipe was installed incorrectly or the joints aren't glued correctly.

Recommended trees and bushes

Regardless of how old your sewer infrastructure is, it is a good idea to stick with trees and bushes that don't have aggressive root systems if planting near sewer infrastructure. The following tree species could pose problems: ash, sweetgum, poplar and cottonwood, oak (usually lowland varieties), locust, willow, basswood, tulip tree, sycamore, and many acer species (red, sugar, Norway, silver maples, and boxelder). The following

bush species also have aggressive root systems: boxwood shrubs, holly bushes and shrubs, and ivy plants.

Trees that are typically recommended near pipes include Amur maple, Japanese maple, dogwood, redbud, and fringetree.

Locating water or drainage lines

Of course, before you can determine the best option, you will need to figure out if there are any water or drainage lines on your property. The first thing you can do is to survey your property for manhole covers, water meter covers, and cleanout caps (used for inspection and access points for sewage lines). If you suspect you may have some pipes in areas near trees, you can request a map from public utilities or call 811 to have utilities marked. You can view a map of SD1 infrastructure at <http://www.sd1.org/CustomerService/GISMaps.aspx>.

If you suspect your pipe could be affected by roots, you can have a plumber run a camera through the pipe to inspect for trouble areas. This service usually costs between \$200

and \$300, which may seem pricey, but keep in mind that if you wait until there is a problem, you may end up with two inches of water in your basement and spend thousands on cleaning and restoration.

A service line inspection will tell you where your line goes and what condition the line is in. This helps to avoid surprises and lets you address small issues before they become big issues.

So to recap — the best way to avoid root issues is to:

- Know where your pipes are and what condition they're in
- Replace old pipes
- Plant trees and bushes that don't have aggressive root systems near pipes, and make sure they have plenty of room to grow.
- If installing new pipe, consider using solid barriers such as plastic, wood, or metal. Chemical barriers such as sulfur, sodium, zinc, borate, salt, or herbicides can also create barriers around pipe.
- If you prefer faster-growing trees and plants, plan to replace them every 8-10 years.

SD1 recognized for innovative collaboration

SD1 has received a Leaders Innovation Forum for Technology (LIFT) Intelligent Water Systems Challenge Award from the Water Environment Federation and Water Research Foundation for supporting innovative excellence in intelligent water system practices and promoting meaningful opportunities for fostering the adoption of smart water technologies.

The award was the result of an international research competition

in which SD1 partnered with APTIM, Covington-based technology firm Global Quality Corp. (GQC), the Metropolitan Sewer District of Greater Cincinnati (MSDGC) and Northern Kentucky University (NKU).

The team, led by GQC President Dr. Sudhir Kshirsagar, evaluated how next-generation telemetry communications, 3-D printing and sensors found in household appliances can be combined with cloud computing to provide wastewater utilities with

low-cost remote sensing alternatives to monitoring sewer overflows and water quality conditions during wet weather events.

The prototype sensors developed by the team are being refined by GQC based upon the team's initial findings and will be tested in real sewer conditions in the near future by SD1. In the meantime, the research will be presented by Dr. Kshirsagar at the World Environmental & Water Resources Congress in May 2020.

doTERRA first learned of the St. Elizabeth Cancer Center from one of its wellness advocates who was a former patient of Dr. Flora and is now a cancer survivor. Inspired by St. Elizabeth Healthcare's personal and integrative approach to medicine, which aligns with doTERRA's philosophy and focus on wellness and addressing the needs of the

whole person, doTERRA made a generous donation of \$5 million to the St. Elizabeth Foundation Cancer Center Community Campaign — the largest donation ever received by the Foundation. This donation symbolizes the start of a synergistic partnership between the two organizations.

Expansion of stroke and brain tumor care

New 2020 imagery is coming!

The Kenton County PVA Office is ready to launch its 2020 EagleView flight. EagleView imagery is captured with patented proprietary camera systems that enable us to see the County from multiple perspectives. Images are captured by low-flying airplanes, depicting oblique perspectives as well as an orthogonal

(overhead) view of every parcel throughout Kenton County.

Oblique aerial images captured from the north, south, east, and west directions offer the PVA Office a 360-degree view of every property in Kenton County. Ortho imagery provides a true top-down view and is critical to the PVA Office's Sketch

Department, which utilizes the ortho images to determine the perimeter square footage of all real property in the county. Both images boost the PVA Office's ability to assess all property in a fair and equitable manner.

EagleView is a recognized means of meeting the PVA's statutory obligation to "physically inspect" all

parcels throughout the County and in an effort to capture up-to-date information, the PVA has contracted to fly every two years. The 2020 flight is a joint venture with LINK-GIS.

It's a bird, it's a plane — EagleView planes, that is! Look for them in the sky in March!

2020 property review

In keeping with statutory requirements, the PVA office is required to review properties at least once every four years. The PVA office will be reviewing properties in Crescent Springs/Villa Hills Fire District and the

cities of Crescent Springs, Crestview Hills, Edgewood, Ft. Wright, Taylor Mill, Villa Hills. You can view and update your property information online at www.kentonpva.com. If your property is not in any of these areas, yet you would like to discuss

your assessed value, you may call our office any time after January 1, 2020. Please visit our website for additional information on the review process.

Reduce your net taxable value by applying for the Homestead or Disability Exemption

Did you know that you may qualify for a reduction in the taxable value of your home, thereby reducing your property taxes?

The Kentucky Homestead Act is a tax exemption established for the benefit of the senior or disabled homeowner. Property owners in the State of Kentucky are eligible for the Homestead Exemption (HEX)

if they are the legal owner of record of their home as of January 1 for the year in which they turn 65. To qualify for the homestead exemption, a person must be at least 65 years old during the tax period and the property must be owned, occupied and maintained by the taxpayer as their primary residence on the January 1 assessment date.

Not 65 years of age but 100% disabled? You may still qualify for a disability exemption (DEX). In order to qualify for the disability exemption, a person must be classified as 100% totally disabled under any government and/or most private retirement system(s).

The 2020 exemption is \$39,300. (Only one exemption per location.)

EXTENDING KNOWLEDGE

Changing Lives

See what happened from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019!

Your Kenton County Extension Service provides research-based educational programs in the areas of Family and Consumer Sciences, Agriculture, Horticulture, 4-H Youth Development and Community Development. This issue features an overview of our programs from last year.

Family and Consumer Sciences

- Kenton County Homemakers again raised and awarded over \$2,500 in High School scholarships. Kenton County Homemakers also spearheaded the “Healthy Horticulture” seminar-featuring a variety of home gardening programs. This year they are especially proud of one of their own! Cathy Kunkel-Mains was named a Master Farm Homemaker Member AND State 4-H Chairman for the Kentucky Extension Homemakers Association.
- Regular programs are held at St. Ayloysius, City Heights, Elsmere Senior Center, Life Learning Center, Kenton County Libraries, Food Banks, and various schools. These programs cover topics including nutrition, general health, food safety, and stretching your dollar.
- A variety of food, nutrition, and health classes were taught, including topics on food preservation, food safety, roasting vegetables, What’s for Dinner-beef, poultry, and seafood; Plate it Up, Cook Smart, Eat Smart; plus arthritis and bone health.
- As baby boomers are approaching

retirement age, they may struggle with financial decisions. Classes on Estate Planning and Medicare addressed some of these concerns. As these boomers face retirement, a class “Retired, What Now?” focused on budgeting, leisure activities and scholarly pursuits. A 4-hour workshop, “On the Road to Retirement: Protecting Your Money” featured speakers on Medicare, the latest scams, investing, financial management and insurance.

- Each year, on average, Kentuckians deal with 30-50 days associated with thunderstorms, 12 tornadoes and three fatalities related to tornadoes. Preparing for emergency situations can be crucial to survival and safety. The class on “Are You Ready for an Emergency” provided tips on preparing your family and home for these events. Tips on handling

food during power outages and floods was shared, along with communication, family emergency plans, and the need for a kit for emergencies.

- Technology continues to play an important part in everyday life. The class on “Planning Your Digital Estate” discussed what happens to your digital property after you are gone. Questions were answered on who would have access to online bank accounts, email, social media accounts and do they close, disappear or remain in the cloud.
- 300 families of relatives raising children gained support and education through 9 monthly support group meetings and by receiving a copy of the local resource guide printed by the Extension Service.
- 56 individuals participated throughout the year in healthy home programs that increased knowledge of mold and moisture clean up as well as decluttering to prevent falls.
- As a result of the long term commitment by FCS Agents at the Life Learning Center in Covington, they were honored at the 2018 Partner Appreciation breakfast as the Educational Partner of the Year.

Agriculture

- Over the past year, more than 200 soil and forage analysis tests were completed for Kenton County farmers.
- County Agriculture Investment Program (CAIP) was administered by the Kenton County Farm Bureau in cooperation with Cooperative Extension Service and was utilized by more than 40 farmers in the county.
- Kenton County Extension Service collaborated with Boone and Campbell counties to offer the third annual Northern Kentucky Equine Conference and included over 90 youth participants from across the region.
- Kenton County partnered with the Northern Kentucky Cattle Association to offer Bull Soundness evaluations in April. There were more than 50 bulls tested. The purpose of this program is to ensure the herd bull is healthy enough for the upcoming breeding season.
- Efforts in marketing Kenton County grown food have begun with a committee formed to develop and implement a local campaign to promote food that local residents can buy from Kenton County farmers.

Kenton County Cooperative Extension Service

- Muddy conditions caused by winter feeding areas for cattle operators can cause erosion and loss of potential grazing areas for the following year. Kenton County Extension offered a program to demonstrate different ways of recovering those areas.
- In 2018 the Banklick Watershed Council was introduced to a local dairy in need of a lagoon for water conservation. One of the strengths of Extension Service is bringing resources to farm operators. The Extension Agent was able to facilitate a grant offered to the dairy farmer for this water conservation program.

Horticulture

Kenton County Extension Horticulture blossomed this year. Here's a little of what we did in the 2018-2019 fiscal year:

- New Master Gardeners are now ready! Eighteen people took the Kenton County's Master Gardener classes this past winter. Kenton County's Master Gardeners donated over 1200 hours of service worth thousands of dollars to the community. Three dozen residents of two long-term care facilities participate in monthly horticultural therapy activities provided by Extension and our Master Gardener volunteers. Juanita Mills was awarded Master Gardener of the Year for her years of dedicated service and hard work.
- Did you know we offer free individual consultations on garden, landscape and plant care? Get your soil tested, too, and receive

customized fertilizer and amendment recommendations. More than 300 soil tests were performed for County residents this year.

- In June, volunteers planted 500 tree seedlings on the grounds of our new building at 450 Kenton Lands Rd. in Erlanger.
- Kenton County's Outdoor Education Center's demonstration gardens grew 1,000 pounds of produce which was donated to local food banks and used for Extension classes and activities. At the annual Farm Harvest Tour and other fall events, hundreds of visitors toured the Three Sisters vegetable gardens, the Prairie garden, and saw Monarchs and other butterflies in our Monarch & Pollinator waystation.
- More than 350 people participated in classes and trainings in topics from Apple-grafting to Wildflowers. We also collaborate with community partners to put on the Public Workers Tree Seminar and the Tri-state Green Industry Conference each winter. These educational events, attended by more than 700 persons, featured day-long training and continuing education credits in topics from aquaculture to tree disease management.

- Kenton County Cooperative Extension receives donations of vegetable and flower seed packets from seed companies. More than 3,000 packets were given to Kenton County residents at Earth Day, to local schools for garden and class programs, used at Extension and community gardens, and in other Extension classes and programs.

4-H Youth Development

4-H Youth Development programs served 5,299 youth participants. Represented in this number are the following:

- 4-H's chick incubation program reached 1,107, in 11 classrooms including special needs youth and 4-H Poultry club. 4-H'ers were introduced to the science of living things and lifecycle development.
- 4-H's natural resources program and science education engaged 867 Kenton County youth and adults in classrooms, after-school, day camps and provided 652 hours of direct education.
- 213 4-H'ers participated in production agriculture projects and horse projects, successfully competing on county, district and state levels.
- Partnering with 4 school districts Kenton 4-H planned and implemented the 4-H Reality Store for 1,080 students; 72 volunteers were involved.
- 238 adult volunteers were involved in educational programs, training opportunities, councils and committees directing local youth programs.

- 136 youth participated in overnight camp and 13 summer day camp programs, including geology, entomology, photography, art and health were attended by 147 youth.
- School clubs met 632 times including 1,755 youth participants. Clubs focused on Natural Resources, Kentucky culture, nutrition and consumer education.
- 541 participated in consumer and financial education programs where youth learned to "Think before they buy."
- Instructed 1,037 youth in healthy food choices, food safety, physical activity and anti-bullying.
- 154 youth participated in Family and Consumer Science programs like sewing, needlework, fashion, and babysitting.
- 397 Kenton County youth engaged in public speaking and demonstrations; 66 advanced to the County Communication Event; 13 advanced to the Multi-County Communication Event; and 2 participants advanced to the state level.
- 490 middle school youth participated in "Step Up to Leadership" school enrichment programs.
- 35 youth participated in Shooting Sports.




History of Bavarian Brewery on display at Kenton County Government Center

Thanks to a generous donation from L. Ried Schott, a descendant of the former owners of the Bavarian Brewery, and a partnership with the Behringer - Crawford Museum, the history of Bavarian Brewery has come to life at the Kenton County Government Center. On the first floor, the exhibit highlights over 150 years of its history. Soon there will be additional displays on the second floor including even more of the historic artifacts.

In order to expand the exhibit, the curators are searching for more artifacts that may be in the community:

- Any Pre-Prohibition items for Bavarian Beer, Meyer-Riedlin or Riedlin Beer (before 1919)
- Prohibition items for the Riedlin Beverage Co. (1919-1925)
- Any items in the early years after the brewery was reopened in 1935-1942.
 - o Items would include labels, bottle caps, openers, signs, posters, ads, postcards, photos, cases, barrels, signs and letters/envelopes or other related material.

In addition, a tribute is being organized for those past workers at the Bavarian Brewery and consideration is being given for an annual event for those who had relatives that worked

there. Over 200 names of workers at the brewery from the late 1800s until the early 1960s have been compiled, and the goal is to make this list as complete as possible.
